LAST GAME OUT RECAP

EVANSVILLE, Ind. - The Evansville Otters scored in six separate innings to wrap up their exhibition game slate with a 10-1 win against the Black Sox on Tuesday morning.

The game opened with solid pitching from the Otters, as Ryan O'Reilly and Ryan Campbell combined for four innings of no hits or runs allowed.

On the offensive side, Evansville scored a pair of runs in each of the second, third and fourth innings. Left fielder Elijah MacNamee opened the scoring with a two-run shot to left in the second inning.

The Otters added two runs in the second, thanks to a fielder's choice and passed ball. Catcher Justin Felix got in on the long ball fun with a two-run home run of his own in the fourth inning, bringing the Otters' advantage to 6-0.

The Black Sox would find their sole run of the day in the fifth inning thanks to an RBI single from the third basemen.

Evansville answered back immediately in the fifth as designated hitter Steven Sensley doubled in a run.

The Otters scored another pair of runs in the seventh inning, with the first run scoring on a fielder's choice hit by Sensley. Pinch hitter Andy Armstrong rounded out the inning with a sacrifice fly to center to bring in infielder Zach West.

Center fielder Miles Gordan closed the scoring for Evansville with a solo home run in the eighth inning, giving the Otters the 10-1 lead that would hold out to the end.

The Black Sox recorded just three hits in the contest and recorded two errors.

Evansville had 10 hits, eight of which were for extra bases. Third basemen J.R. Davis went 3-for-3 on the day, scoring twice. MacNamee finished 2-for-3, scoring twice as well.

The Otters' pitching staff combined for 16 strikeouts and just one walk.

Evansville kicks off their 2022 Frontier League season on Friday when they host the New Jersey Jackals at 6:35 p.m. at historic Bosse Field in Evansville.

Pro-ball history in Evansville

Professional baseball in Evansville dates back to 1884, formerly played at the Louisiana Street Grounds, until the completion of Bosse Field in 1915. On June 15, 1915, the Evansville Evas claimed victory over the Erie Sailors in a 4-0 shutout in front of 8,000+ fans. The only two currently operating ballparks older than Bosse Field are Fenway Park (1912) and Wrigley Field (1914). Over 100 Hall of Fame baseball players have set foot on Bosse Field, and a number have played for pro-teams while representing the city of Evansville. Hall of Fame ballplayers who have represented the City of Evansville at Bosse Field include Chuck Klein, Hank Greenberg, Warren Spahn, Jack Morris, Bert Blyleven, and Ford C. Frick Award Winner Bob Uecker. Edd Roush also played for the Evansville Evas (River Rats) in 1912-1913, before Bosse Field was built. Other notable players to take the field for Evansville at Bosse Field include Kirk Gibson and Oakland A's manager Bob Melvin.

Stambaugh signed

Evansville Otters starting pitcher Dalton Stambaugh was signed by the Chicago Cubs on Saturday, June 19, 2021. Dalton Stambaugh, from Fredericksburg, Ohio, signed and joined the Otters heading into the 2021 season. The left-hander brought with him previous affiliated baseball experience with the Baltimore Orioles organization. Stambaugh went 2-0 with a 3.57 ERA, while striking out 24 batters in 22.2 innings pitched with the Otters this season. His last win came against the Schaumburg Boomers on June 13. In the outing, Stambaugh struck out seven and went 6.2 innings pitched. The signing will be the latest stint in affiliated baseball for Stambaugh. Stambaugh was drafted by the Baltimore Orioles organization in the 30th round of the 2019 MLB June Amateur Draft out of Morehead State University. He went on to pitch in 2019 with Gulf Coast League Orioles. Stambaugh is the first Otters player from the 2021 season to be signed to an affiliated organization. Former Otters pitchers Randy McCurry and Chris Nunn were the last from Evansville to sign with the Cubs organization in 2017.

Evansville Otters recognized with Frontier League postseason honors

The finish of the regular season also included some postseason accolades and honors for individual Otters members. Infielders Riley Krane and J.R. Davis, along with relief pitcher Logan Sawyer, were recognized as postseason all-stars. Krane, the first baseman postseason all-star, batted .271 with 17 home runs and 73 RBIs. His home run and RBI totals were good for top-five in the Frontier League. He also had 23 doubles. Davis, the second baseman postseason all-star, hit .316 with eight home runs, 56 RBIs, 18 doubles, and 35 walks. Sawyer had a league-leading 25 saves, which also matched the Otters' single-season record set by Edgar Lopez in 2015. Sawyer had a 2.97 ERA with 48 strikeouts in 39 appearances and 36.1 innings pitched. Otters field manager Andy McCauley also was recognized with the Frontier League's Roger Hanners Manager of the Year award for the third time overall and second in an Otters' uniform. McCauley led the Otters to 57 wins for a second consecutive season. Earlier in the season, McCauley surpassed 1,000 professional managerial wins in his career and eclipsing 500 wins as the Otters' manager. Following a canceled 2020 due to the pandemic, McCauley led the Otters to another 55-plus win season after only having five returning Otters from the 2019 roster.

Former Otters pitcher Sittinger gets MLB Call-Up with Diamondbacks

In Sept. 2021, the Arizona Diamondbacks called up former Evansville Otters pitcher Brandyn Sittinger to the major league level. Sittinger was added to Arizona's MLB parent club roster on Sept. 8, where he pitched a scoreless seventh inning of relief in his MLB debut against the Texas Rangers. Sittinger induced two groundouts, including a 4-3 double-play off the bat of Adolis Garcia. Sittinger ended 2021 with five appearances for Arizona. Sittinger signed with the Diamondbacks organization out of Evansville in late 2019. The former Otter joins Brad Ziegler, Justin James, R.J. Swindle, and Travis Schlichting on a list of players that Andy McCauley managed and later made it to the big leagues. Sittinger, from LaGrange, Ohio, signed and joined the Otters midway through the 2019 regular season after a stint with the Detroit Tigers organization. The right-hander was drafted by the Detroit Tigers in the 17th round of the 2016 MLB June Amateur Draft out of Ashland University, reaching as high as Double-A with the Erie SeaWolves. In consecutive starts in early August of 2019 against the Southern Illinois Miners and the Washington Wild Things, Sittinger combined to go 12 innings pitched, allowing no earned runs, and struck out 21 batters. Overall, Sittinger went 2-2 with a 1.42 ERA and 52 strikeouts in 38 innings pitched and seven appearances with the Otters. The 27-year-old made his Major League debut after five Minor League seasons from 2016-19 and 2021 and 112 career relief appearances. In 2021 at Double-A Amarillo in 12 games and Triple-A Reno in 21 games, he made 33 relief appearances and went 1-2 with five saves, a 4.03 ERA (17 ER in 38.0 IP), a .204 opponent average, 17 walks and 51 strikeouts. Sittinger joins two other former Otters to get the call-up to The Show, joining pitchers George Sherrill and Andrew

Werner. Sherrill went on to a lengthy MLB career from 2004-12 for four franchises and an All-Star selection in 2008. Werner pitched for the San Diego Padres in 2012 and then later moved on to become a baseball pitching coach after his stint in MLB.

Boots Day retires After 2021 season

Bench coach Boots Day retired at the end of the 2021 Frontier League season. Day was the Otters' inaugural field manager in 1995 and had been bench coach under current manager Andy McCauley since 2012. The former Darren Bush Frontier League Coach of the Year carried a career in professional baseball for over 55 years. The Evansville Otters organization alongside Frontier League Commissioner Emeritus Bill Lee recognized Day earlier in the 2021 season with a presentation for his 55 seasons in professional baseball. Day began his professional career in St. Petersburg, playing in the Florida Instructional League in 1965. He won his first pro-ball championship with the Arkansas Travelers in 1968, where Day led the club in batting average (.295) and home runs (17). Day made his major league debut on June 15, 1969, with the Cardinals, made the Chicago Cubs Opening Day roster under Hall of Fame manager Leo Durocher ahead of the 1970 season, and went on to spend 1970-1974 with the Montreal Expos. Day played under three hall of famers. In 1971, his best season, Day hit .283 with four home runs and 33 RBIs for the Expos, also leading all National League center fielders with nine outfield assists and boasting the second highest fielding percentage among NL center fielders. He also played for the Evansville Triplets from 1975-78, winning the Junior League World Series in 1975. Day also spent time as a coach and scout in the Tigers organization. He later worked in the Yankees system between 1990-1991. After spending three seasons in the Kansas City Royals Organization as a scout, Day's coaching career brought him back to Evansville in 1995, when he was asked to lead the Evansville Otters as the fledgling ball club's manager in its inaugural season. After the 1995 season, Day ventured to spend time as a coach in the Cleveland Indians organization. Day then returned to the Cardinals organization for another six-year tour, including time under Tony La Russa, and then heading to the Royals organization. Day returned to the Frontier League in 2011 with the Normal Cornbelters, came back to Evansville in 2012 to join Andy McCauley's staff. The Frontier League would also recognize Day with the Darren Bush Coach of the Year award in 2012. In 2016, Day won his sixth championship in professional baseball, when the Evansville Otters won the Frontier League Championship Series. 2021 marked Day's 55th season in professional baseball, having instructed, played with, for and against numerous Hall of Famers. Day is a member of three Hall of Fames in his own right, as the Greater Utica, Mohawk Valley, and Illion Hall of Fames have each inducted Day for his monumental achievements in the game of baseball.

Former Evansville Otters pitcher Patrick McGuff was hired by the Milwaukee Brewers organization to be a player development coach at the minor league level. It has yet to be determined where McGuff will be assigned in the Brewers' farm system, but McGuff is likely to be assigned to one of the Brewers' Single-A affiliates, starting his Minor League coaching career with either the High-A Wisconsin Timber Rattlers or the Low-A Carolina Mudcats. Most recently, McGuff spent two seasons as a volunteer assistant coach with the South Carolina Upstate baseball program, working with the pitchers. McGuff helped their pitching staff become one of the best in the Big South Conference and highly ranked among many statistical categories on a national level. At the end of the 2021 season, Upstate ranked 16th in the NCAA in ERA (3.68), while leading the Big South in strikeouts per nine innings (9.1). The Spartans also recorded a 1.32 WHIP, good for 37th in the nation. McGuff was a starting pitcher for the Evansville Otters for parts of 2018 and 2019. He was signed out of Evansville in 2018 by the Cincinnati Reds organization and signed from the Otters in 2019 by the Arizona Diamondbacks organization. The former 36th round MLB draft pick out of Morehead State was one of the most dominant starters in the Frontier League while with the Otters. McGuff combined to go 8-1 with a 1.25 ERA. In 11 total starts and 72 innings pitched, he struck out 86 batters. In his last start in an Otters' uniform on June 7, 2019, against the Schaumburg Boomers, McGuff went the distance, tossing a shutout. That day, he struck out 11 and had only a single hit off him.

Frontier League introduces sudden death baseball

The Frontier League of Professional Baseball announced the introduction of a sudden-death tiebreaker to determine the winner of extra-inning games. For any regular season game tied at the end of regulation (nine innings for a traditional game and seven innings for a double-header game), and remaining tied following one inning of play using International Tiebreaker (ITB) rules, a sudden death inning will determine the winner. Field managers will meet with umpires with the home manager choosing offense or defense. For the team on offense, the player on the lineup card immediately preceding the batter due up will start on first base. The defensive team will have three outs to prevent the offense from scoring. If the team on offense scores they will win the game, while if the defensive team retires the side without scoring a run, they will win. As with the ITB runner, if the runner placed on first base scores, the run will be unearned. The sudden death rule guarantees that no game will be played beyond 10.5 innings or beyond 8.5 innings for a double-header game. The rule was first proposed by former Florence field manager Dennis Pelfrey, who currently manages in the San Francisco Giants' organization. It was refined by a committee of Frontier League managers and administrators, including managers Andy McCauley of Evansville, Quebec's Pat Scalabrini, and Ottawa's Bobby Brown.

Otters pitcher Scott signed by Blue Jays

The Evansville Otters have announced that starting pitcher Braden Scott has been signed by the Toronto Blue Jays. Scott, from Clinton, Ind., and a former Indiana University product, signed and joined the Otters for his first professional baseball season in 2021. The left-hander went 8-4 with a 2.72 ERA and 104 strikeouts in 14 starts and 89.1 innings pitched in 2021 for the Otters. Scott finished the 2021 season winning his last two starts, combining to go 14 innings with 21 strikeouts, and allowing only one earned run. He had four starts with 10 or more strikeouts - two with 10 and two with 12. In his career with the Indiana Hoosiers, Scott posted a 3.25 ERA in 55.1 innings and 39 appearances, racking up 81 strikeouts. Scott is the second Otters player from the 2021 season to be signed to an affiliated organization. Left-handed starting pitcher Dalton Stambaugh was signed by the Chicago Cubs organization in June 2021. Scott is the first Otter to sign with the Blue Jays organization since shortstop Scott Heying in 1998. The Otters have sent 83 players to affiliated organizations out of Evansville.

Former Otters manager Tagert joining Giants organization

Former Evansville Otters manager Greg Tagert announced he is joining the San Francisco Giants organization after most recently serving as the skipper of the Gary Southshore RailCats for the last 17 years. Tagert will be managing for the Giants' affiliate in the Arizona Complex League, working primarily with rookies and the occasional rehabbing veteran player. He will be based in the Giants' Spring Training complex in Scottsdale, Ariz. A professional field manager since 1995, Tagert was Evansville's manager for four seasons from 1997-2000. He spent nine seasons in the Frontier League before his hiring with the RailCats in 2005 and leading the franchise in the Northern League and American Association. While at the helm of the Otters, Tagert accumulated a 177-148 regular season record and a 7-10 postseason record. He led the Otters to the Frontier League postseason in each of his four seasons, including two championship series appearances. Evansville also finished first in the West Division in 1997 and 1999 under Tagert. Tagert is third in Otters' history with 342 games managed and 184 overall wins. He saw nine players get signed to affiliated baseball while leading the Otters. With the RailCats, Tagert had a 835-744 record, won two Northern League championships in 2005 and 2007, and won the American Association championship in 2013. Plus, Tagert was named the Northern League Manager of the Year in 2007 and 2009, as well as the

American Association Manager of the Year in 2016. He additionally saw more than 20 players get signed to MLB affiliations while with the RailCats. Overall, Tagert has won 1,214 games in 25 seasons as a professional field manager. Originally from Vacaville, Calif., Tagert got his start in professional baseball as a scout for the Detroit Tigers. Prior to that he was a pitching coach at the University of New Mexico. His first professional managerial stop was with the Ohio Valley Redcoats of the Frontier League in 1995.

Frontier League welcomes Empire State Greys for 2022 season

The Frontier League of Professional Baseball announced a partnership with the Empire League which will own and operate the Empire State Greys as a participant in the Frontier League during the 2022 season. The Greys, based out of Tupper Lake, New York, will be playing all of their games on the road, but will field a team by adhering to the same roster and salary rules as all Frontier League clubs. The Empire League began play in 2016 and features four teams in upstate New York and northern New Hampshire. The Empire League is owned by brothers Eddie and Jerry Gonzalez along with MLB outfielder Matt Joyce. Eddie Gonzalez played in the Frontier League from 2006-08, including participating in the 2006 Championship Series. Jerry Gonzalez played as an infielder in the Los Angeles Angels' organization in 2007 and 2008. Matt Joyce has appeared in 1,400 MLB games over a 14-year career, and saw post-season action for Tampa Bay, Atlanta, and Miami. The Empire League moved 34 players to MLB Partner Leagues during the 2021 season, including 10 to the Frontier League. Current Frontier League coaches Joe Gannon (Tri-City) and Jared Lemieux (New Jersey) plus former Frontier League and current Atlantic League managers Jamie Keefe and Mark Mason have worked with the Empire League. The Empire State Greys will hold spring training at their home base in Tupper Lake, New York, before starting regular season play at the Gateway Grizzlies on May 13. Empire State will play in the league's Eastern Division. They will play one 3-game series against the eight Western Division clubs, three series against the three Canadian teams in the Eastern Division, and four series against the four United States teams in the Eastern Division.

With the Otters, Davis batted .316 with 54 runs, 18 doubles, a triple, eight home runs, 56 RBIs, and four stolen bases in 91 games played. Davis was named a 2021 Frontier League Postseason All-Star. Davis, from Vallejo, Calif., last played for the Washington Wild Things in 2019, where he hit .273/.310/.373 through 150 at bats. Davis spent four years in affiliated ball, after the St. Louis Cardinals drafted the Oklahoma State University product in the 15th Round of the 2016 first-year player draft. In 2019, while in the Seattle Mariners organization, Davis had the opportunity to play a game at the AAA level with the Tacoma Rainiers and collected a base hit. In his Junior Year at Oklahoma State University, Davis hit .347/.422/.438 with 13 doubles and 32 RBI through 256 plate appearances.

#5 Justin Felix - C

With the Otters, Felix batted .136 with 15 runs, nine extra-base hits, and 14 RBIs. In 2019, Felix played in 27 games for the Explorers, collecting a total of nine hits, including a double, triple, and five home runs through 65 plate appearances. While with Sioux City, Felix slashed .170/.313/.509, with an OPS of .822. After two years with the New Mexico Military Institute, Felix played his junior and senior seasons with Arkansas State University, hitting 18 home runs in 369 at bats.

The outfielder also brought with him five seasons of experience with the Cincinnati Reds organization. Gordon played for the Arizona League Reds, Pioneer League Billings Mustangs, Florida State League Daytona Tortugas, and the Midwest League Dayton Dragons from 2015-2019. Overall, with the Reds organization, Gordon batted .242 with 13 home runs and 99 RBIs in 908 at-bats. In 253 games played, Gordon scored 130 runs, had 68 totals extra-base hits, and swiped 47 bags. In his time with the Reds, Gordon played with former Otters pitcher Randy Wynne in Dayton in 2019 and roomed with former Otters outfielder Logan Taylor in 2018. Gordon was drafted by the Reds in the fourth round of the 2015 MLB June Amateur Draft out of St. Ignatius of Loyola Catholic Secondary School in Oakville, Ontario.

In 2019, MacNamee batted .309 in 38 games played, scoring 19 runs, recording 17 RBIs, and walking 21 times. MacNamee joined the Otters following his senior season at Mississippi State. While with Mississippi State, MacNamee was a member of two College World Series appearances in 2018-19, and a member of a Super Regional appearance in 2017. In his collegiate career at Mississippi State, MacNamee batted .287 with 113 runs, 37 doubles, 17 home runs, 116 RBIs, and 60 walks in 170 games played and 154 games started. He also had a career .441 slugging percentage and a .367 on-base percentage.

#1 Gary Mattis - INF

Mattis journeyed to Evansville following an illustrious tenure with the Tennessee Wesleyan Bulldogs in his junior and senior seasons. In the Spring of 2021, Mattis slashed .408/.523/.896, clubbing 25 home runs and driving in 82 runs in 55 games and 201 at-bats. Mattis was selected at the end of the 2021 Spring season as an NAIA Gold Glove award winner at the shortstop position and named the NAIA's player of the year --- the first in Tennessee Wesleyan baseball history. Tennessee Wesleyan is also the alma mater of Mattis' teammate, Dakota Phillips.

Perez served as a minor league call-up and backing up the likes of Tony Cruz and Yadier Molina. From 2015-18, Perez played at the high Double-A and Triple-A levels of the Baltimore Orioles farm system. Perez also played several seasons in the Dominican Winter League and has made international appearances representing the Dominican Republic. In his minor league career, Perez batted .270 with 275 runs, 693 hits, 132 doubles, 68 home runs, and 376 RBIs. In 10 seasons in the Dominican Winter League, Perez has also tallied an additional 27 runs, 95 hits, 20 doubles, and 48 RBIs.

#7 Dakota Phillips - C

In his second season with the Otters, Phillips hit .256 with 38 runs, 16 doubles, 12 home runs, and 45 RBIs in 72 games played. In 2019, Phillips batted .233 with 24 runs, 15 doubles, seven home runs, 32 RBIs and 21 walks in 64 games played with the Otters. Following the cancellation of the 2020 Frontier League championship season due to COVID-19, Phillips played with the Lightning Sloths of the Constellation Energy League. With the New York Bucks in 2018, Phillips batted .250 in 12 games with a home run and six RBIs. Phillips played collegiately at Tennessee Wesleyan for his senior season. With Tennessee Wesleyan, Phillips hit .353 with 14 home runs and 47 RBIs. Phillips also had 17 doubles, 38 runs, and 29 walks.

The infielder made it as high as Double-A Bowie. Overall, in the Orioles' farm system, Reyes batted .269 with 225 runs, 540 hits, 117 doubles, 39 home runs, and 248 RBIs. He has also played Dominican Winter League baseball for three seasons.

#21 Steven Sensley - OF

Steven Sensley is from Baton Rouge, La. and is entering his first season with the Otters. He brings with him four seasons of experience with the New York Yankees organization, who drafted him in the 12th round of the MLB June Amateur Draft out of Louisiana-Lafayette. In those four seasons, most recently with the Hudson Valley Renegades of the Yankees' High-A East affiliation, Sensley combined to hit .240 with 140 runs, 51 doubles, three triples, 44 home runs, and 129 RBIs. He also added 13 stolen bases. In 2018 with the Charleston Riverdogs of the Single-A South Atlantic League, Sensley was an all-star and was named the team's player of the year. Before signing with the Yankees organization, Sensley was drafted two previous times in the 33rd round by the Minnesota Twins in 2013 out of high school and in the 38th round by the Tampa Bay Rays in 2015 out of Louisiana State-Eunice, but he decided to finish out his collegiate career. He spent his last two collegiate seasons at the University of Louisiana at Lafayette.

#__ Yoel Yanqui - INF

Yoel Yanqui, from Cuba, is a utility player who can play first base and in the outfield. Yanqui has three seasons of affiliated experience with the Arizona Diamondbacks and one season of affiliated ball with the Cincinnati Reds, most recently with the Chattanooga Lookouts in 2021 at the Double-A level. Yanqui's combined minor league totals include a .284 batting average, 192 runs, 353 hits, 67 doubles, 17 triples, 20 home runs, 173 RBIs, and 47 stolen bases. He also has played multiple seasons in the Dominican Summer and Winter Leagues as well as in the Cuban National Series.

Evansville Otters Coaching Staff

#22 Andy McCauley, Manager (13th Season) - Andy McCauley has been the Otters' manager since 2010. He increased his managerial records in Otters' history in 2021, sitting first in franchise history in regular season wins (531) and games managed (1,006). McCauley's overall win total stands at 538. McCauley has led Evansville to five postseason appearances, including the 2016 Frontier League Championship season. He was the 2021 and 2014 Roger Hanners Award winner for Frontier League Manager of the Year, and in 2014, he guided Evansville to the playoffs that season for the first time since 2006. McCauley accepted the manager's position on July 6, 2010. In 50 games that year, he led the Otters to a 19-31 record but revamped the franchise. The Otters had a slower start in 2011, but with McCauley's leadership, were able to finish the second half of the season above .500. The Otters had 45 wins in 2012 and 51 victories in 2013 (the team's first winning season since 2005). In 2014, Evansville won 57 games and after a 48-48 season in 2015, the Otters finished with 55 regular season wins in 2016. McCauley guided the Otters to postseason appearances with 52 wins in 2017, 51 wins in 2018, and a franchise-tying record of 57 wins in 2019 and the franchise's first Frontier League division title since 1999. The Otters followed that up with another 57-win season in 2021. McCauley has managed in the Frontier League before. In 1998, he became the skipper for the Kalamazoo Kodiaks. The next season, McCauley managed the London Werewolves, another Frontier League team, to a 54-30 record and a league championship. McCauley has also had success in the Northern League from 2002-09 with the Quebec Capitales, Schaumburg Flyers and Kansas City T-Bones. It was with Kansas City that he also won another league championship in 2008. McCauley is a 1991 graduate of Mansfield (Pa.) University.

#3 Bobby Segal, Hitting Coach (7th Season) - Bobby Segal, who has been involved with college and/or professional baseball every year since 2003, is in his seventh season as hitting coach for the Evansville Otters and eighth campaign as part of an independent league field staff. Segal previously spent nine spring seasons and four summer campaigns coaching all levels of college baseball. Prior to 2022, Segal had helped 19 teams to a 852-505 (.628) overall record. His six professional clubs had posted a 343-262 (.567) record, while his 13 college squads registered a 509-243 (.677) mark. Segal has seen 18 of his 19 teams tally a winning record, while all ten of his summer clubs finished in the top two of their respective divisions. Segal has helped five of his independent league teams to postseason berths. Evansville captured the 2016 Frontier League championship and advanced to the playoffs each of the following three seasons. The Gary (Ind.) SouthShore RailCats claimed the 2013 American Association title when Segal was their hitting and third base coach. With Segal in the dugout, the Otters have turned in regular season records of 57-39 (.594), 57-39 (.594), 51-45 (.531), 52-44 (.542) and 55-40 (.579). He was named the Darren Bush Frontier League Coach of the Year following the 2017 season in Evansville. In Segal's lone campaign in Northwest Indiana, the RailCats finished regular season action 58-41 (.611). In six previous seasons as an independent-league instructor, Segal has seen 20 players move up to teams affiliated with Major League Baseball organizations. Segal saw 94 players advance from junior college to four-year institutions. The figure includes 66 Division I players, with many of the nation's top conferences represented. In addition, 74 of his college players went on to sign professional contracts. Before arriving in Evansville, Segal logged time with five regular season collegiate programs in five different states. Seven of his nine teams enjoyed national rankings, while six earned berths in national postseason tournaments. Segal served as the top assistant, recruiting coordinator, hitting coach and third base coach at Wabash Valley College (Ill.) from 2013-16. The 36-year-old was the recruiting coordinator and hitting coach at Tarleton State University (Texas) in 2012. He worked with infielders, hitters and coached first base at Iowa Western College in 2011. The Indianapolis native worked with catchers, hitters and coached first base at Butler University in 2010. He spent the 2008 and 2009 campaigns as a graduate assistant at Union College (Ky.). Prior to joining the Otters, Segal also spent four summers mentoring players in collegiate wood-bat leagues. He managed the 2014 and 2015 Terre Haute (Ind.) Rex after serving as the hitting coach and catching instructor for the same organization in 2012. He started 2010 as the top assistant for the North Adams (Mass.) SteepleCats and finished the summer managing the club. A catcher at Indiana University from 2003-06, Segal was a three-time Academic All-Big Ten selection. He earned a bachelor's degree in sport management from IU in 2006 and master's degree in health and physical education from Union in 2009. Segal is married to the former Rachel Harvey. The couple has two sons, Asher and Jacob, and one daughter, Lillian.

#26 Max Peterson, Pitching Coach, (9th Season) - San Diego native Max Peterson is in his ninth season as the team's pitching coach. Peterson is a five-year veteran of minor league baseball and is a former 18th round pick of the Oakland Athletics. He pitched three years in the A's organization and another two with the Chicago White Sox. He also has Frontier League playing experience, saving 12 games for the Southern Illinois Miners in 2012. In 2014, his first professional season as a coach, Peterson piloted Evansville to the playoffs for the first time since 2006 and a 3.30 earned run average, which was lowest in the Frontier League. The Otters yielded a league-low 46 home runs and accumulated a league-high 788 strikeouts. During the 2016 championship season, the Otters finished with a team ERA of 3.97 and 721 strikeouts. In 2019, Peterson was given the Darren Bush Frontier League Coach of the Year Award. Peterson's guidance led six Otters' pitchers to being signed to MLB affiliated organizations. Peterson also led the Otters' pitching staff to a franchise single season record of 868 strikeouts, which led the Frontier League. The franchise's last record-setting mark was 832 in 2017.

#25 Billy Easley, Assistant Coach (2nd Season) - Billy Easley is entering his second season with the Otters, primarily working with the catchers. He had been an assistant coach at NAIA Oklahoma City University for six seasons. While at OCU, Easley helped coach two All-Americans and three professional catchers. He earned his Bachelor's degree in Radio/Television/Video from the University of the Ozarks and a Master's degree in positive coaching from the University of Missouri.

#_ Phil Britton, Assistant Coach (11th Season) - Phil Britton has been an Otters catcher and spring training instructor since 2012. The Olney, Ill. native played for the Otters in 2011, hitting .262 with two home runs and 15 RBIs. Britton played professional baseball for seven seasons including five with the Atlanta Braves' organization and two years with the Baltimore Orioles. He played as high as Class AAA with Norfolk of the Orioles' organization in 2010.

#_ Rob Watson, Assistant Coach (13th Season) - Rob Watson guided the pitching staff in Evansville during the 2010 season and has assisted since 2011. Watson played his college baseball at Oklahoma State before being drafted in the 17th round of the 2002 MLB Draft. Watson had a six-year playing career (2002-08) including two full seasons under manager Andy McCauley with the Schaumburg Flyers (2006) and Kansas City T-Bones (2007). With Kansas City, Watson arguably had his best season, hitting .343 and being named to the All-Independent League second team. The following year, he hit .344 while with the T-Bones before joining the Phillies' organization. Watson also coached with Penn State during the 2005 season.
